Education

Information on education in New York State — including enrollment, school finance, degrees granted, tuition assistance, libraries, cultural organizations, and public broadcasting.

Highlights

- Close to 2.964 million students were enrolled in public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools in Fall 2014, over one-quarter below the peak enrollment of 4.3 million in 1970.
- New York's public elementary and secondary schools had 207,558 classroom teachers serving over 2.5 million students in 2014 compared to 188,817 teachers serving 3.5 million students in 1970.
- New York's public elementary and secondary schools spent \$58.4 billion in 2013.
- There were 897,740 full-time and 373,683 part-time students in degree-credit enrollments in New York's higher education institutions in 2013.
- There were 454,839 full- and part-time students enrolled in the sixty-four campuses of the State University of New York (SUNY) in the Fall of 2014.
- An estimated 302,476 students received State Tuition Assistance Program (TAP) aid in the year 2013-14, down from 305,120 from 2012-13.
- The New York State Archives contained 142,815 cubic feet of holdings in 2014 and fielded 39,462 research inquiries.

1 The local units charged with the administration of schools in New York State may be placed in three categories:

- The “common school district” dates from 1812 and is limited to providing education through the eighth grade. The district was originally set up in 1812 to render “common schooling” or the three Rs. The district was, and for the most part has continued to be, small in area. Some common districts have consolidated but continue to function as common school districts. The district is governed by a sole trustee or a board of three trustees.
- City school districts are subdivided into two fiscal categories. School districts of cities of population under 125,000 are fiscally independent. School districts of the “Big Five” cities (population over 125,000) are fiscally dependent and have boundaries that are coterminous with the city.
- The “union free district,” unlike the common district, may provide high school services when granted a charter by the Board of Regents, although some union free districts provide elementary school services

only and in that regard function quite like common districts. Central school districts and central high school districts, while organized under special provisions of the law, function thereafter as union free districts and may, therefore, properly be put in the category of union free districts. When a union free or central district employs its own superintendent of schools, it is called an independent village superintendency district. Its operation, however, is not changed materially.

 - BOCES (Boards of Cooperative Educational Services) are service organizations created by law to do for a district that which it cannot do by or for itself because of size, financial burden, etc. BOCES are not included in the “Total Districts” column because they function as providers of services to regional groups of school districts.

As of the Fall 2010-11 Data Collection, all the Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System (IPEDS) institutions are required to use the new postbaccalaureate award levels. Changes to the award levels affect only postbaccalaureate award levels. The changes can be briefly summarized as the

elimination of the first-professional degree and first-professional certificate, and the expansion of the doctor's degree into three categories: Doctor's degree-research/scholarship, Doctor's degree-professional practice, and Doctor's degree-Other. Ultimately, IPEDS institutions have the discretion to decide how to recode their postbaccalaureate awards; this tip sheet simply provides suggestions on how to do this recoding.
